BISON TENNIS

A HISTORIC SEASON LED BY ALUMNI

Bison Boys Tennis team grabbed the first Boys Class B State Title for McCook High School on October 14th at the Woods Tennis Center in Lincoln.

Leading up to the state tournament the Bison boys earned the #3 seed at 1 singles, #8 seed at #2 singles, #4 seed at 1 doubles and #1 seed at 2 doubles. This put them in a great position to make some noise at the tournament. We knew it would be a battle between us, Elkhorn North and Lexington, as all three teams were deep and had battled with us in earlier meetings.

The first day of the tournament saw three of the Bison state entries receiving firstround byes. Our #2 singles player Kaiden **Porter**, (son of Stacey Gonzales Porter '95) played his first match versus Omaha Brownell/Talbot/ Concordia, winning 6-0, 6-1.

After that first match it was a constant flurry of matches with our teams playing in multiple places at the

same time. To let the others know they were cheering all on, an occasional "Go Bison" yelled during the matches would be repeated by the others!

Porter had a close 2nd round match, defeating Lincoln Christian 7-5, 5-7, 13-11; #1 singles Nathaniel Miller defeated Beatrice 6-0, 6-1; #1 Doubles team of Evan Humphrey and Lincoln Michaelis (son of Brian Michaelis '94 and Terra Ellerton Michaelis '94) defeated Elkhorn 6-3, 6-2; the #2 doubles team of Joel Miller and Payton Dellevoet (son of Jodi Young Dellevoet '95) defeated Nebraska City 6-1, 6-1.

Porter had a tough 3rd round match, losing to Elkhorn North 1-6, 0-6 moving him to the consolation rounds on Friday. **N. Miller** defeated Lexington 4-6, 6-3, 10-6 to move to the semifinal round on Friday. **Humphrey** and **Michaelis** defeated Lexington 6-3, 6-0 to also move to the semifinal round Friday, and J **Miller** and **Dellevoet** beat

Kearney Catholic 6-2, 6-1, putting them in the semifinal round. With three of our four entries in the semi-finals we led the team standings by 2 points over Elkhorn North and 4 points over GICC after the first day

of matches.

Porter losing in the consolation round to Mount Michael 4-8, which moved him to the 7th place game. He lost to Crete in that match 4-8, earning him a solid 8th place, which was where the team needed him to be.

Next up was a pivotal match in the #1 doubles spot where **Humphrey** and **Michaelis** faced a highlyfavored Elkhorn North team, who had beat them easily twice before state. The Bison team came out on fire and downed Elkhorn North 6-3, 6-0, putting them in the finals!

The #2 doubles team with **J Miller** and **Dellevoet** had a key match playing Elkhorn North and handled them easily, 6-1, 6-3.


We ended the morning session with all three of our teams in the finals! Many fans from McCook and across the state were starting to feel the excitement. We clearly had a great shot to take it all.

The final matches were all excellent. **N Miller** at #1 singles took runner-up at state losing to a tough Crete opponent 6-2, 6-2. The Bison doubles teams brought all they had to the finals matches. **#1 doubles** defeated Mount Michael 6-1, 6-3 to take home gold. **#2 doubles** defeated Lexington 6-4, 6-4 to earn their gold.

The players will tell you that earning the individual medals was sweet, but the sweetest moment of all was when the McCook Bison were announced as the Class B State Champions! Coaches Matt Wiemers ('87), and Greg Larson, along with volunteer coaches Chad Graff ('85) and Karlie Dueland ('14) were asked to hand out the gold medals to their team. It was an unforgettable experience for all.

Coach Wiemers discussed afterwards how it was extra special to have alumni and former players help lead this team to a histroic achievement. Karlie Dueland ('14) played on the Girls Tennis Team throughout high school and has been volunteering with the boys team

for a number of years. She will be moving into an assistant coach with the girls team this spring. Chad Graff ('85), who played tennis with Coach Wiemers in high school, moved back to McCook two years ago and began volunteering with the Bison team.

The team standings ended up McCook 50 points, Elkhorn North 35.75, GICC, Crete, Lexington. The Bison tennis team showed incredible fight this year with many successes. Coach Wiemers reached his 200th boys dual win during this year. 5 of the 6 varsity players, N Miller, J Miller, Humphrey, Michaelis and Dellevoet reached 100 wins and the FIRST ever boys tennis Class B team title was won. All of the state participants were honored with All-State honors. N Miller, Humphrey and Michaelis were named to 1st Team, J Miller and Dellevoet were named to 2nd Team and Porter was Honorable Mention.

McCook is proud of the character, heart and determination their Bison boys showed during the entire season and especially at the state tournament. All of the players have made many friends with other teams, esMany friends and family travelled to support the team.



Alum seeks to help hometown with housing shortage

Housing is an issue in almost every community and McCook is no exception.

So the McCook Economic Development Corp. is taking a proactive step to address the issue with the addition of a Housing Development Director.

Amanda Engell (formerly Slattery) stepped into the newly-formed role last month, joining the team at the MEDC.

Engell graduated from McCook High School in 2015 and from the University of Nebraska at Kearney in 2019 with a degree in interior design and construction management. She also interned with Wilkins ADP (Architecture Design Planning), working on kitchen and bath designs. Her husband, Will, is a sales manager at Wagner Chevrolet Buick and they got married three days before Engell started her new job.

Since starting as the housing development director, Engell has immersed herself in current MEDC and statewide programs, with the plan to make those resources available throughout the community. She also plans to dive deeper into the current housing market, including those houses not in use or those residences which need upkeep.

As Engell learns the ropes of her new job, she continually hears about the role of housing in nearly every issue affecting the community. "There is not a lot of incentive to move a business to our community if there isn't housing for the workers," Engell said.

In regards to the current state of housing in McCook, Engell said there has not been a lot of housing development in recent years.

"The current stock is older, needs rehabbed or needs to be torn down," she said. "One idea is to find funding to deal with vacant or dilapidated houses."

And the rental market is not a lot better, with the common response to finding a rental being "good luck," she said. "But housing shouldn't be left up to luck."

She added, "We need to educate landowners on being landlords and develop additional rental properties."

As for the future of the housing situation, the MEDC already has sev-



eral goals on the agenda and that is where Engell will play a vital role: to move those projects forward, including finding a developer to build a new apartment complex or duplexes.

She will also spend her time making connections with potential builders, getting the word out about resources available for new or upgraded housing. And down the road, the position may also involve property management but the priority is to develop more housing to address the community's needs.

And Engell has a good understanding of construction jobs and working with contractors on projects, according to MEDC Director Charlie McPherson.

"We are excited to have her on our team and Amanda understands the importance and scope of the work ahead with our housing needs," McPherson said. "She will be the person in direct contact with any developers in the area who have an interest in building housing and connecting them with resources, both local and statewide, as well as possible use of TIF financing and LB840 funds."

And there is a dire need for housing.

According to a recent community housing study, McCook is 200 residences short of what is needed, McPherson said. "This affects the workforce, talent recruitment, even families returning to the area," he said. "Anyone looking to come here is looking for a house."

Engell admits that she doesn't have much experience in housing or this line of work.

"But I've got great mentors and an EDC board ready and willing to help me," she said. "And I'm excited to be

back in the community and working with people to make things happen here."

She is also excited to get involved in the community and make a difference.

"In order to keep Mc-Cook thriving, people my age need to step up and take on these challenges, working side-by-side with those who have been doing the work," she said. "And then at some point, those people can sit back and enjoy the fruits of their labor in a great community."

Museum board president Carol Schlegel welcomed the group and shared visions for the future at the museum.






