BEAUTIFY MCCOOK

First impressions matter.

And that is why a group of volunteers formed LightUp McCook two years ago. Their goal was to create a positive first impression for visitors as well as to have a welcoming and inviting atmosphere for residents in their own hometown. The group just wanted to make something happen.

The effort began by installing holiday lights along the rooflines of downtown Norris Avenue and the trees in Norris Park in 2022.

As the group took on more projects, the group evolved into Beautify McCook, which has blossomed into a year-round effort to improve the community aesthetically - literally and figuratively.

Once the lights were in stalled on the McCook skyline for the winter season, the group turned its attention to bringing color to the downtown during the spring and summer months with blooming flower pots.

For summer 2023, Beautify McCook oversaw the installation of planters on every corner of downtown Norris Avenue to bring a spot of color and vegetation.

To maintain the plants during the hot summer months, several volunteers, including Gary Wiemers, Bruce Mc-Dowell and Steve Lenhart, took turns watering each planter every day.

When winter returned, the contents of the planters were replaced with holiday greenery.

The projects have happened through a variety of donations, from financial donations, donations of time or in-kind donations, such as 1,000s of feet of holiday lights from McCook's ACE Hardware. Funding is being overseen by the McCook Community Foundation Fund, with all donations to the projects tax-deductible.



None of these projects are big on their own, but cumulatively they will make an impact on the community. The slogan of the group is "one light, one flower, one project at a time."

And Beautify McCook continues to expand in 2024. To provide funding for flowers every summer and replacement of the holiday lights as needed, the group has formed "Friends of Norris." Businesses, individuals and organizations can be-

come "Friends of Norris" by contributing at least \$150 a year toward the project. The "Friends" will be recognized on social media and online as well as invited to a gathering in October.

Beautify McCook is also looking to expand beyond downtown McCook with a project to help homeowners make improvements who can't physically or financially do it themselves. This may be painting siding, tidying up a front yard or fixing a

broken fence. This effort is being led by the young adults in the community who want to help those who want to Beautify McCook but just need a little help.

Other possible projects include new bike racks in the community, an outdoor sound system

throughout downtown, and additional electricity to meet the needs along Norris Avenue and in Norris Park.

The ideas keep coming. The only limitations are time - volunDistrict, which is working to revitalize downtown McCook through various projects from upstairs housing to new lighting.

Beautify McCook is supported by Celebrate Mc-Cook, an account that was established years ago at the McCook Community Foundation Fund to "celebrate McCook."

And for the non-alcoholic connoisseurs, there is a selection of nitro cold brew coffee, root beer, and sodas that are just as tasty.


Every beverage is selfserve and paid for by the ounce. Meaning that if you want to sample an array of beers, the possibility is right at your fingertips.

McCook Working to Become Nebraska's Creative Hot Spot

In October 2023, Mc-Cook became an official certified Nebraska Creative District, the 15th community in the state to receive the designation. By early 2024, more than two dozen communities were named Creative Districts across the state with the number of communities applying for the designation to reach into the 40s.

Why are so many communities vying for this designation and what does it mean to become a Creative District?

A creative district is also an economic tool, proposed by Sen. Mike Flood of Norfolk and approved by the Nebraska Unicameral. The Nebraska Creative District Program utilizes the arts as an economic driver to support communities in Nebraska by telling their stories and elevating the value of the arts.

The McCook Creative District officially encompasses downtown Mc-Cook between East First and West First Streets, from A Street by the train depot to I Street north of the McCook City Library. It

was designed to be walkable by those who live in

the community or who are just visiting.

But McCook's Creative District organizers know that the entire community will benefit from this designation. Future plans will include collaboration with the McCook Schools, McCook Community College, the YMCA, and local art organizations, groups and individuals, both inside and outside the creative district boundaries.

McCook is especially honored to receive the designation from the Nebraska Arts Council, as the late Gov. Frank Morrison of McCook established the state-wide organization while governor in the 1960s.

The McCook Creative District is "housed" under the McCook Arts Council, as a non-profit or

governmental agency had to serve as the district administrator. This is a volunteer board, which was formed 40 years ago by Floyd Hershberger and continues to serve a vital role as the coordinator and promoter of arts in McCook and Southwest Nebraska.

The board currently oversees the Creative Dis-

trict, determining what that designation looks like moving forward, but with a focus on the mission set forth in the designation.

The mission of the McCook Creative District is to cultivate a vibrant community and diverse creative economy through collaborative opportunities for artistic and cultural expression. To achieve that mission, a top priority for McCook's Creative District is to create a paid part-time art coordinator position, a long-term goal of the local art community.

"The late Cloyd Clark actually came up with the concept of an arts organizer more than 20 years ago," according to Matt Sehnert ('82), who helped lead the applica-

tion process for McCook's Creative District. "Yes, it has taken a while, but we are so glad to see it finally come to fruition."

Another goal specific to the McCook Creative District includes creating a "48 in 48" tourism program, where visitors disembark from the Amtrak train in McCook — 48-county — and spend two days — or 48 hours — exploring the local art offerings.

And this summer, the Creative District, along with several other local groups, are bringing "Third Thursday's" to downtown McCook, highlighting artists, businesses and organizations on the third Thursday of the month from May through October.

The creative district has also brought many local entities together for a common goal of making McCook an arts and culture destination - or to be Nebraska's Creative Hotspot. Just a few organizations involved in the Creative District include


the McCook Community Foundation Fund, the McCook Economic Development Corp., the City of McCook, Community Hospital, and the McCook Chamber.

The creative district designation came with a \$10,000 Nebraska Arts Council Certification Grant. McCook has used these funds to create a Creative District website, mccookcreativedistrict. com, to highlight what McCook and Southwest Nebraska already has in place.

The website will also be home to all that we hope will happen in the near future involving arts and culture.

The designation also opens up other financial opportunities, specific to creative districts. Mc-Cook's Creative District helped spearhead the application for a Nebraska Department of Economic Development planning grant.

In March 2024, McCook

was awarded a \$100,000 Civic and Community Center Financing Fund grant which will be used for a variety of projects, from the image and identity of McCook to revitalized downtown.

There will be a lot of changes because of the Creative District designation and the collaboration that is happening so check-in on social media for updates and make plans for a visit to Mc-Cook, Nebraska's Creative Hotspot.

Star Player

Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame portraitist Chris Brown ('94) captures the state's athletes in top form

As long as Louisiana keeps producing world-class athletes, Chris Brown has a job, and what a job it is. He is the portrait artist to stars — Louisiana sports stars, that is.

Since 2009, Brown has been the official portrait artist for the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame in downtown Natchitoches. During those past 14 years, he has painted 158 portraits of hall of fame inductees, including stellar athletes such as Archie, Peyton and Eli Manning, as well as Shaquille O'Neal, three-time Super Bowl champion

Kevin Faulk, eight-time Mr. Olympia Ronnie Coleman, four-time world champion steer wrestler Steve Duhon, and — among others the incredible champion basketball player and coach Kim Mulkey, who recently coached her LSU women's basketball team to the NCAA National Championship. The impressive list goes on.

"Getting to paint some of the most famous athletes in the world is inspiring," says Brown. "Being able to start with nothing and create something absolutely new to the world is intoxicating." Actually, Brown, who was born in Nebraska and now resides with his wife and son just north of Fort Worth, had a pretty good run as an athlete. He played college baseball at Cowley College in


> Kansas before moving on to play at Northwestern State University in Natchitoches, where he studied art and art education. He also chalked up a fairly successful six-year career playing for minor

league teams owned by the Chicago Cubs and the Texas-Louisiana/Central Baseball League.

Brown, however, walked away from baseball in 2003 when he traded in his glove, bat

and ball for paints, brushes and a new career as a professional artist. Slowly building up a portfolio of commissioned paintings, Brown got his big break in 2009 when Northwestern State University's basketball team slam dunked a sound-of-the-buzzer first-round tournament playoff win over Iowa State University. The university commissioned Brown to do a painting to celebrate the victory.

As luck would have it, Doug Ireland, chairman of the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame, was present when Brown presented the painting to the university. After the ceremony, Ireland asked Brown if he would like to apply for the position of official portrait artist for the hall of fame. Brown jumped




Ireland speaks highly of Brown's work and his relationship with hall of fame inductees. He gets these new members personally involved in his work. Not only was Brown a respected college and professional athlete, Ireland says, but he also was an accomplished artist whose style has contributed significantly to the hall of fame's identity.

"Chris was very good

when he came on board as our official artist," says Ireland. "The growth in his artwork, and the expansion of his repertoire, has been so impressive to watch. There's no decision I've made since becoming chairman in 1990 that I am any more gratified by than selecting Chris to be our artist. He has become an invaluable member of our team. His emergence as one of America's premier sports artists is well deserved."

When painting portraits, Brown works mostly from photographs of the inductees, especially

painters prefer their subjects to be physically present during the process, Brown says the new photographic technology works well for him when new hall-of-famers choose photographs that are composites of all the teams they played on during their careers, or when they select an image that expresses a special moment when you can see "the emotion in their faces."

Though some portrait

He wants them to relive that moment again in their portraits, and

> only a photograph taken at that time captured that expression. In addition, photographs enable him to show inductees exactly what the portrait will look like before he starts.

"Portraits are the toughest form of art simply because you have to be exact, especially with someone
that is world
famous,"
says Brown.
"Literally everyone
knows what
they look
like. For me,
the person in
the portrait
needs to be
thrilled with

it. It's not enough for them to be happy with it. That keeps the pressure on to make sure I do the very best I can. I used to get nervous when the hall of fame inductees saw their portraits for the first time. Now I get excited to show it to them. I suppose confidence comes with experience."

Painting portraits to please, however, has its challenges. Each person has unique facial features and that's why he never gets bored painting them.


"Studying faces can be fascinating," says Brown, whose studio wall is covered with 8-foot-tall paintings of Louis Armstrong,



Poseidon and Jesus. "If you are ever talking to me face to face, I'm probably studying your features and working through them in my mind."

Next year a new crop of athletes will enter the hall of fame and Chris Brown will be at his easel.






